Focal WG2 aim: Critical review of 'national policy frameworks for family support rights and provisions'



- Significant inter-governmental agreements to ensure rights to family and parenting support although also limitations
- National engagement and implementation challenges + FS often marginal discourse

Conceptualisation delivery family and parenting support services (Devaney et al 2021) >

- Well developed concepts and theories for FS in some areas
- Significant consensus for holistic frameworks, partnership ethos, prevention-orientation and strengths-based approaches
- However FS often poorly defined and narrowly conceived

Child tamily support policies: 27 national reports (Abela et al. 2021)

- Rich diversity of contexts and provision; Significant progressive developments
- Patchy developments in many countries + FS provision often inadequate and fragmented























Advancing a comprehensive holistic conceptualisation

Family support is the mobilisation and provision of resources and support for sustaining and enhancing family roles and assets; and promoting the well-being and capabilities of family members including children/youth and parents.

Family support includes resources and support provided by 'informal' networks, 'semi-formal' roles and groups, and 'formal' provision and services. Formal services should seek to provide timely and enabling support for children, parents and families based, as much as possible, on an ethos of participation, and promoting inclusive and supportive communities (Churchill, Devaney and Abela, Journal Article currently under review)

European starting points

integrate, 1989 UNCRC = Family & Parental Support key for children's develop and implement rights to equality, welfare and family life

progressive rights-based Investing in Children Rec (EC 2013) = Three pillars: Access policy to resources + Access to services + Children's Participation

> Work-Life Directive (EU 2019) = Improved flexible working, paternity leave and parental leave rights

> **Child Guarantee Rec (EC 2021)** = Guarantee children in need access to essential services

> **Policy to Support Positive Parenting Rec (CoE 2006)** = Three Pillars + Nurture peer and community support + Spectrum of universal and targeted FS services + Positive parenting campaigns + Community participation in decision-making

What do we mean by provisions?

Here we are referring to a wide range of 'resource-based and service-based' provisions (UNICEF 2019; EC 2013; CoE 2006) which include:

- Family and parenting support services (targeted at children, young people, parents, families, communities)
- Economic support
- Employment
- Early Childhood Education and Care



























Opportunities, tensions and dilemmas with regards to family support provision across Europe

Our cross-national country reports gave us an opportunity to see how different countries are developing their services and how we can learn from one another However, it was not always clear what such strategies were meant to achieve e.g.

- highlighting the principles underlying such support(s)
- how anti-poverty and anti-inequality measures are linked
- how resource constraints are managed and
- how collaboration, coordination and interprofessional support are optimised




























There is widely implemented support targeted to vulnerable groups but there is often a gap in the continuum between support and protection

Practitioners are the frontliners offering family support!

- Practitioners working with children and families are expected to work in a **transdisciplinary** *collaborative*, *empowering and nonjudgemental* way and come from various disciplines including educators, social workers, youth work, social care, child carers, family therapists, midwives, doctors and others. All are expected to have developed a way of working that is value based, engaging, effective and evidence-based.
- The relationship with children and families is meant to be *collaborative*, *empowering and nonjudgemental* (Abela, 2009).
- The **self-reflexivity** of the professional is an important hallmark of every professional





























- Are social justice and equity core values informing family support?
