Responsive

- A quality service addresses the need that exist in the target group using proper measures and means that fit to the social, cultural, and/or economic characteristics of the target group.
- A responsive service takes into account the unique aspects of the community/target group such as the characteristics that are related to *social and economic conditions* and *cultural characteristics*.

- *Complexity, contextual fit, financial resources and human resources* are some of the key aspects relating to feasibility of a family support programs.
- A quality family support program seeks balance between complexity of the initiative, conditions and available resources.

- An utmost priority of the quality family support programs shall be following the current principles and standards of ethical practice established by the respective professional organizations as well as European and national policies.

- Participatory planning, management, implementation, and evaluation aims to ensure accounting for the unique needs and expectations of ethnically, culturally, socially, and economically diverse groups.

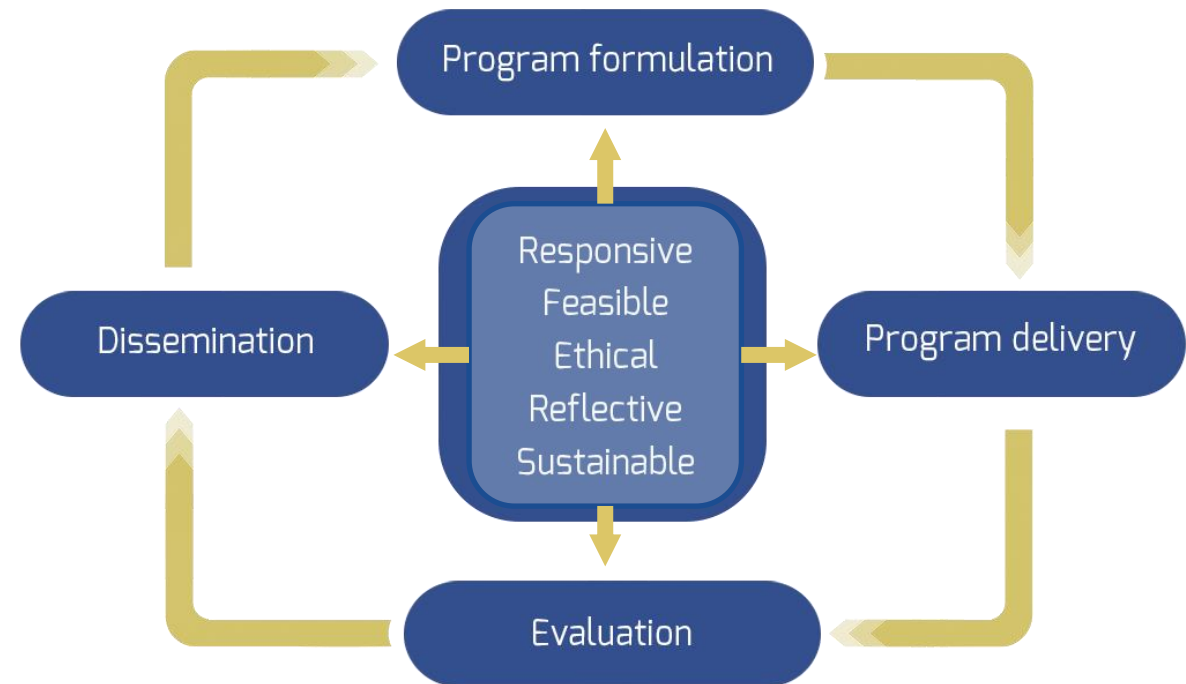

- Family support programs, unless they are embedded in service delivery systems of established agencies, are heavily dependent on availability of financial and human resources.
- Integrating effective high-quality family support programs into the regular practice of existing service systems should be ultimate goal to ensure sustainability of programs.

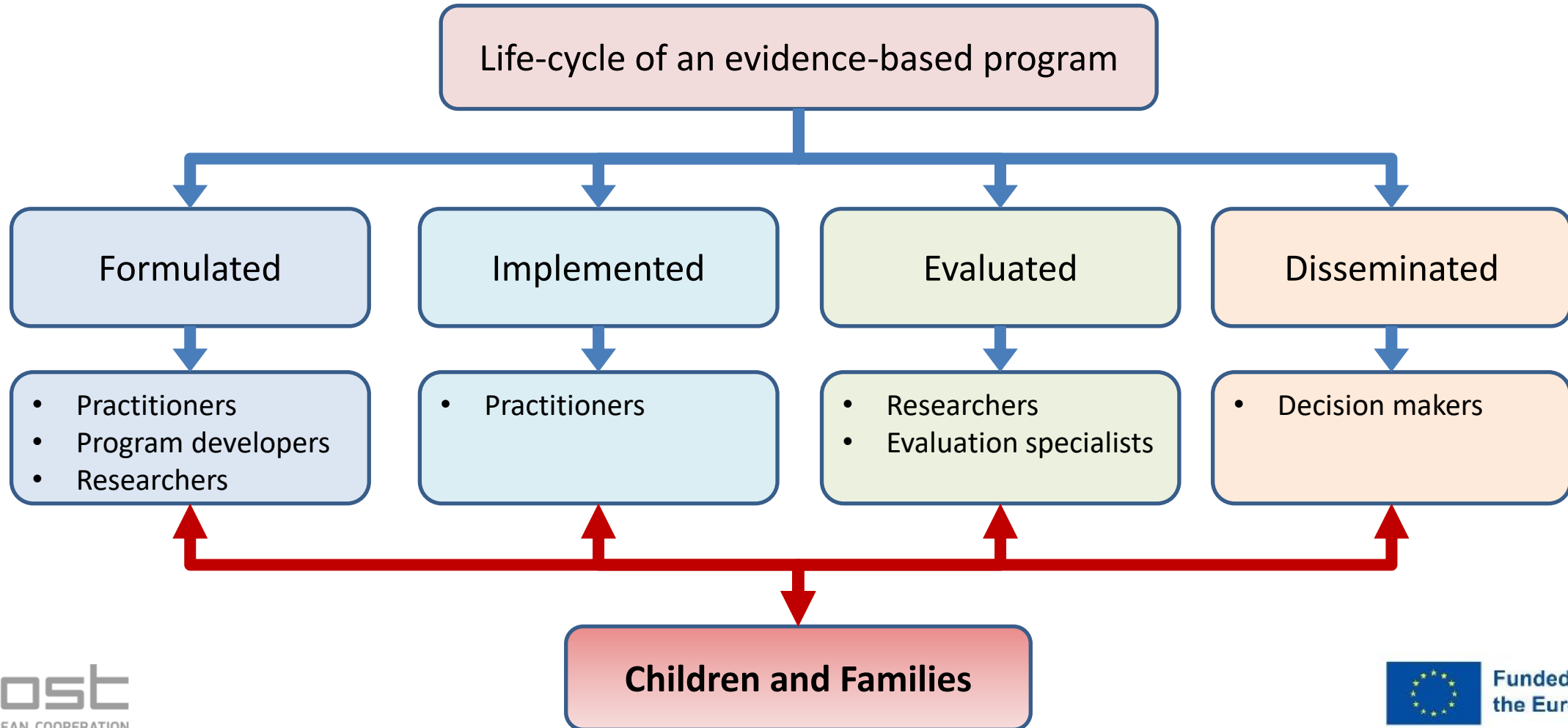

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Current situation in Europe

- The European policy is placing a strong emphasis on adopting EBP approach, as a principle for investment, informed decision-making, and transferability of best professional practices in child and family care.
- However, there is not much information about the actual incorporation of EBP into services and professional practice across countries, leaving unnoticed the potential existence of inequalities in quality family support.
- We examine to what extent the adoption of EBP is taking place in support provision systems in Europe.

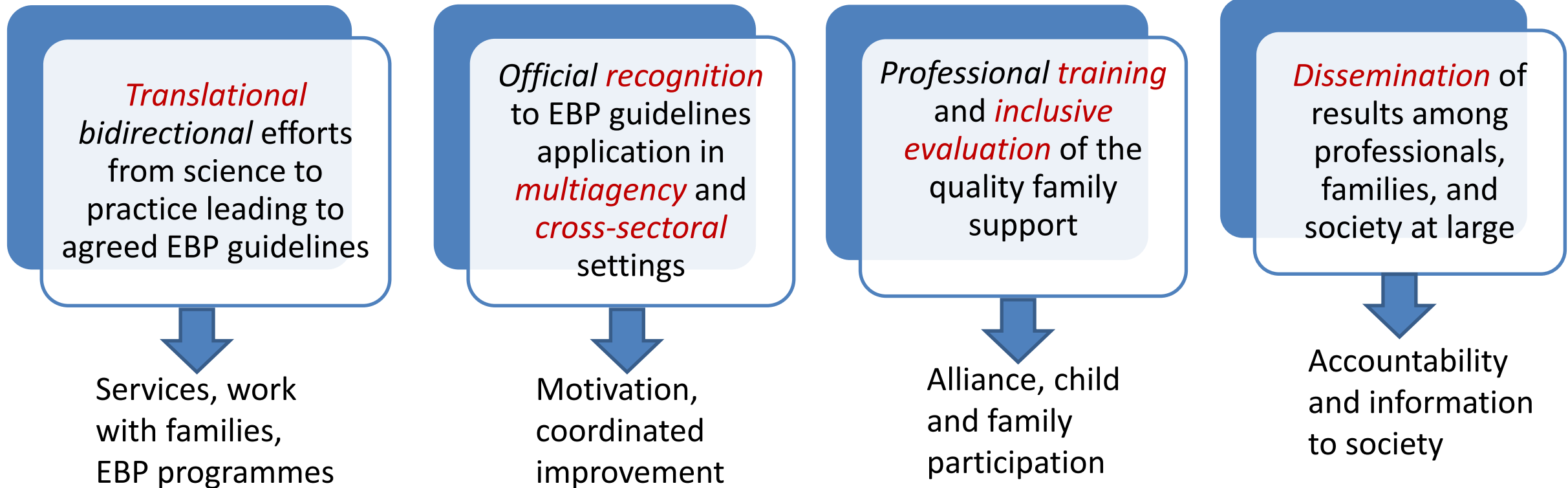

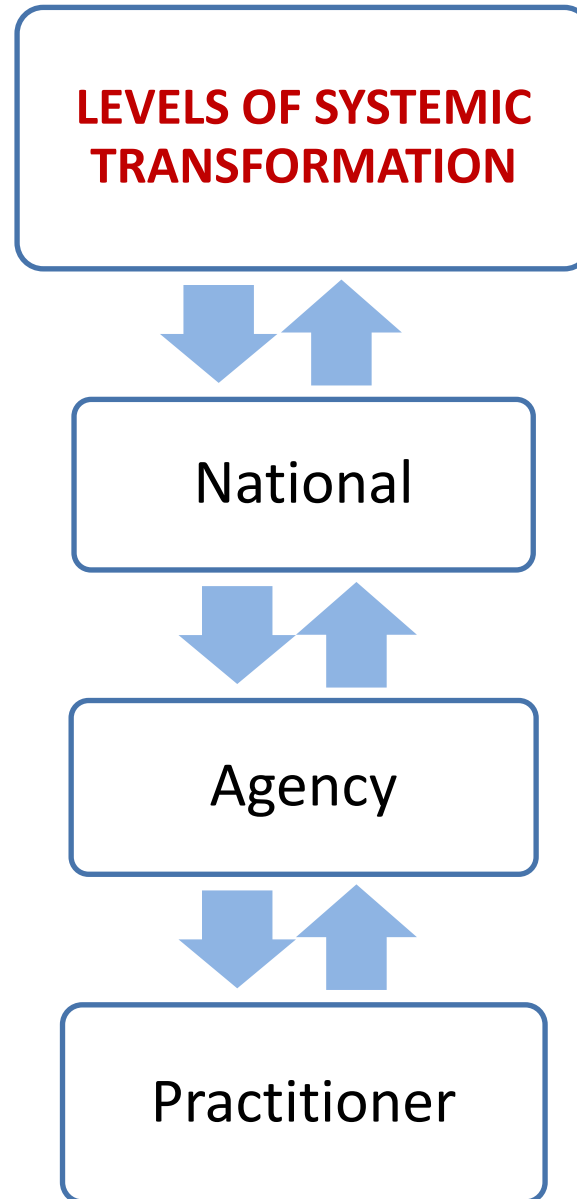

Formative protocol based on self-directed assessment (20 EurofamNet countries)

- EU members: Austria, Croatia, Czech Republic, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Lithuania, Netherlands, Portugal, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden.
- EU candidates: Bosnia-Herzegovina, Kosovo, Montenegro, Republic of Moldova, Serbia.
- Non-EU: United Kingdom, Israel.
- Consensual responses were provided by members of *Eurofam-Net National Supportive Networks* made up of services and social entities at national, regional and local levels in social, education, health, and community sectors.

Results

Initial

- Legal and policy national framework on child rights, protection against violence, and family support **95%**
- Internat. recommendations on child rights and family support **90%**
- Internat. National, Local NGO / National, Regional services **92%**

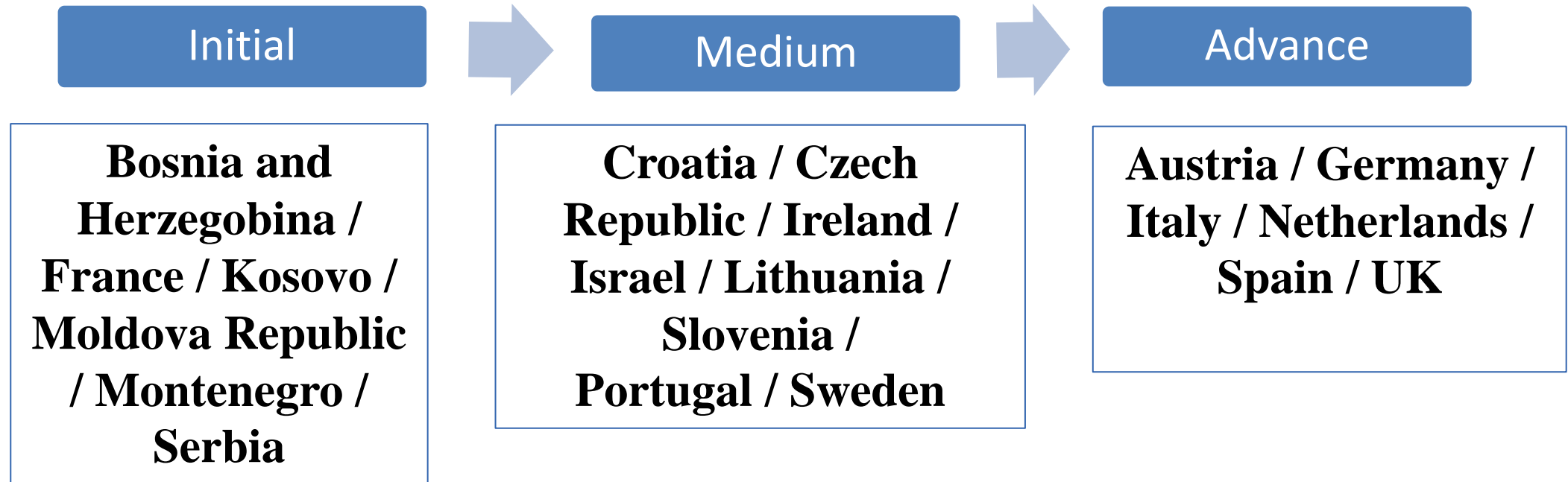
Medium

- Local services **70%**
- Stable bilateral collaboration **55%**
- Acknowledge of EBP guidelines **40%**
- Recognition of EBP use in services **45%**
- Professional training in EBP **65%**
- Cross-sectoral partial adoption of EBP **50%**

Advance

- Stable trilateral collaboration **15%**
- EBP guidelines fully adopted **20%**
- Recognition of EBP in professional teams **20%**
- Cross-sectoral fully adoption of EBP **11.5%**
- Formal EBP professional exchanges **30%**

Progression towards EBP adoption



Great variability in public spending on family benefits, social rights, inclusion, gender equity, child wellbeing, family diversity needs, etc.

“Evidence ecology” for quality family support

- Raise national awareness of the need to adopt EBP to promote the cultural readiness of the system to undergo this transformation.
- Engage stakeholders to advocate for quality services and ensure the participation of children and families in the process.
- Disseminate EBP guidelines in social, education, health, and community sectors to facilitate collaborative work in the child and family support
- Provide interprofesional training for the workforce in accordance with competency standards.
- Ensure the sustainability of quality assurance, especially in times of economical and health crisis, to guarantee the child and family wellbeing.
- Promote recommendations at the European policy level to strengthen quality family support in all countries to overcome inequalities in child and social rights.

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
